School and Community

- The Alice Smith School is a leading British International School in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.
- The school is a non-profit making co-education day school for students between the ages of 4-19.
- The school roll is approximately 1550 students.
- There are 48 nationalities represented: the UK/Commonwealth (38%); Malaysia (39%); with the remainder coming from a wide range of countries in Europe, Asia, Americas and Africa.
- There are currently 95 students in our graduating class of 2019.
- There are no entry requirements for the school apart from the ability to fully access and benefit from an education in the medium of English; we are a fully English speaking school.
- The school year runs from September to July, following a three term cycle.
- The majority of our students come from homes where one or both parents have professional or business backgrounds.
- The majority of the teaching faculty is recruited in Britain with experience of teaching the UK curriculum; the student to teacher ratio is 10:1.
- The school has a history of high academic achievement compared to both the majority of schools in the UK and similar British International schools in Asia.

School History

- The Alice Smith School was founded in 1946 by Alice Smith, a parent who began by teaching expatriate children alongside her daughter. When she left Malaya in 1950, the parents of children attending her school formally incorporated the Alice Smith Schools Foundation.
- The first purpose built campus was opened in 1952 with our second specialised Secondary Campus following in 1997.

Student Rankings

The school does not rank students. Given the nature of our curriculum structure, this would be neither feasible nor just.
 Each student follows a very individualised programme from Year 9 (Grade 8) onwards; it is unlikely that any two students will be following exactly the same range of courses. Quartile Rankings, however, can be made available on request.

US College Applications

- For the purposes of US Application forms, we refer to our Year 13 (graduating class) as Grade 12.
- We will support a maximum of 6 US applications per student; a maximum is implemented to ensure students are informed and selective in their choices.
- All school references written (subject teacher and guidance counselor) are confidential.
- If a student applies for Early Decision we uphold the agreement that they must withdraw all other applications globally.

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Curriculum: Year 10 & 11 – Key Stage 4 (Equivalent to US grades 9 & 10)

- Students follow a two-year course preparing them for the British GCSE and IGCSE examinations.
- This includes compulsory examinable courses in maths (10% of curriculum time), English (15%), and science (20%).
- In addition students choose four or five option subjects each occupying 10% of curriculum time. The choice of option subjects is balanced across the areas of languages, humanities, technological subjects and creative subjects.
- The remainder of time is spent on non-examinable courses in PSHEE (Physical, Social, Health & Economic Education) and Physical Education.

Curriculum: Years 12 & 13 - Key Stage 5 (Equivalent to US grades 11 & 12) GCE A Levels

- Students follow courses leading to the British GCE Advanced Subsidiary (AS) Level and Advanced (A) Level examinations.
- Most students study at least three A Level subjects. Each subject is taught for 5 hours each week in Year 12 and six hours each week in Year 13 plus independent study assignments.
- An AS Level course is equivalent to 40% of an A Level course.
- In addition to their A Level courses, many students will broaden their experience by completing the Extended Project Qualification (an independent research project equivalent to 50% of an A Level), an additional AS Level in another subject and an enrichment, work-related learning and personal development programme.
- Non-examined courses are also included in the curriculum to broaden the experience of the students. All students participate in compulsory Physical Education, PSHEE (Physical, Social, Health & Economic Education) and Higher Education sessions.

Grading System

- Students sitting for (I)GCSEs and A Levels are graded according to the grading system as defined by the Joint Council for Qualifications (UK nationalised grading system).
- Assessments are criteria-based, defined by attainment descriptors for each course, not by statistical percentages.
- Students receive both a full written report and a 1:1 progress meeting between student, parents and subject teacher, as well as a progress grade at 3/4 assessment points throughout the academic year. This progress grade is based upon their attainment against the A/AS or GCSE grade descriptors and gives an indication of their expected outcome at the end of their GCSE and GCE courses.
- Students' progress towards their individual targets is reported on, rather than ranking students.

GPA

Whilst we use GCSE and GCE grade criteria to assess student attainment, for the purposes of US college applications, we have students' attainment grades into a GPA using the conversion guidelines offered by the NCAA (http://www.ncaapublications.com/productdownloads/IS1314.pdf). As such we operate on a 4 point GPA scale incorporating students' final GCSE and GCE grades along with their assessment grades throughout their GCE courses.

Academic Achievement

- The examination results of Alice Smith School students compare favourably against the collective results of schools in the United Kingdom, as published by the Joint Council for Qualifications (JCQ).
 - It should be noted that nearly all students in the UK sit GCSE examinations and that only the top 20% of the UK student population (age 18 years) enter GCE Advanced Level examinations.

It should also be noted that the majority of schools in the Independent sector are academically selective in their intake.

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Activities and Service

- The school supports student participation in events with other international school students in Malaysia and overseas. The Alice Smith School participates in FOBISIA, SEASAC, ISAC and ISAKL sports programmes which include cross-country, basketball, football, rugby, touch rugby, volleyball, swimming and athletics.
- All students are encouraged to take part in a wide range of extra-curricular activities.
- The Alice Smith School is a registered centre for the provision of the International Award (based on the Duke of Edinburgh award which requires young people to be involved in sports, cultural, service and expedition activities).
- The Alice Smith School is a member of the Model United Nations and attends MUN conferences in Singapore and The Hague as well as hosting our own conference.
- All students at the Alice Smith School attend a one week residential experience on a yearly basis. These residential trips focus
 on community service and personal development. Through such trips the Alice Smith School supports community activities
 and projects such as Camps International Project Kenya, mangroves replanting with the Global Environment Centre Malaysia
 and local schools via the Maekok River Valley project in Thailand.
- Throughout the year there are ongoing charity fundraising projects, including our high-profile annual Charity Dinner, for a range of local and international charities including the Make a Wish Foundation and Lighthouse Fund.
